The board of directors of General Motors recently announced the election of three additional executive vice presidents, all of whom will be in charge of operating groups. These changes reflect the re-assignment of responsibilities following the death last month of James E. Goodman, executive vice president of General Motors in charge of Automotive, Body and Assembly, and Automotive Components and Defense Divisions.

Semon E. Knudsen becomes executive vice president with jurisdiction over the Dayton, Household Appliance,

Engine, Overseas and Canadian Group. Mr. Knudsen is a director and a member of the Executive and Administration Committees and since last July has been

group vice president in charge of the Overseas and Canadian Group. Packard Electric is among the divisions which now fall within Mr. Knudsen's area of responsibility.

Edward D. Rollert becomes executive vice president in charge of the Car and Truck, Body and Assembly Group. Mr. Rollert is a director and member of the Executive and Administration Committees and since last July has been group vice president in charge of the Car and Truck Group.

GM Expands Safety Testing Facilities

General Motors President James M. Roche has announced a major two-year program for construction of three additional vehicle safety facilities at the Milford, Mich., GM Proving Ground which are designed to consolidate and expand GM's already extensive safety testing activities.

The facilities include:

1. A safety test engineering building with 88,000 square feet of office and work space which will be the coordinating center for all of GM's vehicle, driver and highway safety activities. It will house a new impact sled crashtest facility in addition to the one GM has been operating continuously since 1962. The original impact sled, now in the proving ground experimental engineering building, will be moved to the new safety test engineering building.

2. A tire test facility will house tire dynamometers and other specialized tire test equipment to test experimental and production tires to meet GM, automotive and rubber industry standards.

3. A vehicle dynamics evaluation facility which, in effect, is a huge paved area (three tenths of a mile square) — equivalent

Tool And Die Apprenticeship Turns Out Skilled Craftsmen

Craftsmen are made, not born. Natural aptitude for the skilled trades is a prerequisite, but the type of training an individual receives during his apprenticeship greatly determines the degree of skill of the journeyman.

The tool and die apprenticeship program at Packard Electric introduces the young man to this highly skilled craft and prepares him for a successful and productive career of quality and efficient workmanship.

Industry has long recognized that it is its responsibility to train and educate young men as machinists and tool and

die makers. In this regard, many companies have displayed commendable records of achievement in the area of apprentice training.

Opportunities

Packard Electric's tool and die apprenticeship program offers the young man the opportunity of learning this highly skilled trade. Successful completion of the program also helps open the door to engineering opportunities and positions of greater responsibility.

Young men selected for the program embark upon a four-year course of classroom and shop training, eventually qualifying them as journeymen. A total of 7328 shop hours and 576 classroom hours must be completed by the apprentice. During this time he is graded both on his classroom and shop work.

But even before the applicant is considered for apprentice training, he has to meet two basic requirements. He must be a high school graduate with at least a C average.

Candidates are accepted up to age 40.

Grades and Tests

In choosing the most qualified candidates, two factors are of primary consideration. They are the grades of the applicant and the results of a battery of tests. The purpose of the battery of tests combined with other qualification factors is to ensure that only outstanding candidates are selected for what are considered outstanding opportunities.

Nineteen small companies in the Warren area are presently vying for Company-of-the-Year award. At the same time, employes of these companies are learning firsthand the inside operations of a business.

That's what Junior Achievement (J.A.) is all about.

J.A., since its inception in 1919, has provided teen-agers with the same kind of learn-by-doing experience that 4-H has given farm youth. In 1964 there were over 5,000 J.A. companies organized throughout the United States and Canada.

The program begins in November and terminates in 4 May. During this period teen-agers participate in three basic business operations: production, sales and management.

Packard Sponsors Two

Among the Junior Achievement companies in this area, two are sponsored by Packard Electric. They are Pack-O-Lite and Extendo-Pack. Pack-O-Lite produces and sells an emergency car safety light and spotlight. Extendo-Pack is in the extension cord business.

Both companies raised capital by selling stock, in order to purchase the components for making

GM Has A Record Year; Outlook Bright For '66

General Motors' capital expenditures in 1966 will total an estimated \$1.4 billion for capacity expansion, modernization, plant replacements, safety, research activities and new model programs around the world, Chairman Frederic G. Donner and President James M. Roche disclosed in the Corporation's 1965 annual report.

The report, with final figures for 1965 operations, also showed that GM set records for the fourth consecutive year in dollar sales and earnings. Worldwide unit sales of cars and trucks, dividends paid to shareholders, worldwide employment

and total payrolls also were

General Motors' program to expand its facilities and modernize its plants around the world continued through 1965. The two-year program announced early in 1964 has resulted in total expenditures of \$2.3 billion during the last two years. Looking forward, the program is continuing and capital expenditures are estimated at \$1.4 billion for 1966, bringing the three-year total to \$3.7 billion.

Maximum Work Stability

GM's 1965 worldwide employment averaged 735,000 men and women, and payrolls totaled \$5,448 million. Nearly one-third of every GM sales dollar was set aside for employes as wages or benefits.

The report also noted that "the corporation was able to schedule its output to provide maximum work stability and continuity for the employes." An average of 409,000 hourly-rate employes in the United States received \$3,396 million in 1965, with weekly wages averaging \$159.55 for working an average of 42.7 hours per week. Their hourly earnings averaged \$3.74 — substantially above that reported for all U.S. manufacturing employes by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

GM's benefit programs reached another milestone in 1965 when GM contributed a record \$603 million under such programs for employes in the United States. Employe benefit programs similar to those in effect in the United States are available to employes in Canadian operations and overseas.

High Capital Outlay

About \$2 billion of the 1965-66 outlay of \$2.7 billion - which will be the largest amount General Motors has ever spent for plant and equipment in a two-year period — is designated for projects in the United States. Some \$200 million will have been spent in Canada and about \$500 million overseas. Following GM's longestablished policy, financing of overseas projects is accomplished through reinvested earnings and by local borrowings which are repaid through funds generated within the local overseas oper-

The GM executives said they "look forward to 1966 being another year of good business."

"The country's economy is strong and consumers are showing a continuing willingness to buy," they said. "Our products are enjoying excellent customer acceptance."



Added Safety

Front seat shoulder belts will be a new safety device available as factory or dealer installed option on all General Motors cars produced after March 1, 1966, James M. Roche, president of General Motors, announced recently.

"In line with the Corporation's progressive safety program, we now offer shoulder belts to Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick and Cadillac buyers because tests show they offer a greater margin of safety in certain types of collisions." GM shoulder belts will exceed the loop load requirement of SAE standards.

Last year's General Motors models included front seat belts as standard equipment. This year, standard safety items installed in all General Motors cars included rear seat belts, padded instrument panel, padded sun visors, outside lefthand rear-view mirror, dual speed windshield wiper and washer, and back-up lights.

The new shoulder belt in all closed car models will be anchored to the inside roof rail behind the user's shoulder. From there it will extend diagonally across the chest and buckle to a strap connected to the inboard seat belt anchor. 
evaluate more effectively the controllability of vehicles, particularly in unusual attitudes such as high speed cornering, panic braking and others.

In addition to vehicle maneuvering studies, the facility also will enable GM engineers to observe driver abilities and characteristics under various driving situations - wet and dry pavement and unusual weather conditions.

It is also expected to contribute to development of driver training techniques and to provide a new resource for developing handling characteristics.

"Actually," Mr. Roche said, "this is a continuation of GM's comprehensive vehicle safety program, an orderly progression, and now we are able to phase construction of these three new facilities in with the overall building program at the proving ground.
