North Industrial Park Expansion Under Way

Totals 301,500 Square Feet

Excavation is under way on new additions to the North Industrial Park facilities, which when completed, will increase the total floor space of the Live Wire Division to nearly three million square feet.

The new construction, totalling some 301,500 square feet, will take the form of four additions: one to Plant 11 and three to Plant 12. The bulk of the new space will be used for manufacturing, finished goods storage and shipping activities, with the remainder consisting of added space on personnel buildings to the front of each plant.

It marks the eighth major expansion at the North River Road site since the Division acquired the 165-acre tract of land in 1954.

General Manager G. W. Chestnut pointed out that the rapid and consistent growth of the Live Wire Division over the years, especially since it became a part of the General Motors family in 1932, should be a source of pride to all Packardites, because it is "a reflection of our fine tradition of quality workmanship.

In 1932, the entire organization covered less than half of the space which will be encompassed by the present new construction.







Packard Electric has long been known as the Live Wire Division, but with the recent announcement that we have developed automotive applications for a light-conducting "wire," you could say that we are also the "Lite Wire" Division.

The new light-conveying product, called "SeeLite," is basically made up of Du Pont "Crofon" plastic fibers, which transmit light energy in much the same way as a copper wire conducts electrical energy.

Due to the flexibility of the wire, several leads can be run from a single bulb, placed in a convenient, easy-to-reach location, to light several less convenient locations. When a bulb and socket cannot be used due to space limitations, the instrument panel component can be lighted by SeeLite.

Pioneer applications of the new product will be found on some 1967 GM cars and trucks. Specific examples of planned uses of SeeLite are:

Pontiac — Two compartmental ash trays and the cigar lighter will be illuminated by SeeLite, using an ignition switch lamp as its light source. Chevrolet — SeeLite, traveling from a bulb in the instrument cluster, will illuminate the ignition

switch.

Buick Riviera — The windshield washer and wiper control switches will be lighted by an instrument cluster bulb via SeeLite.

ment cluster bulb via SeeLite.

Chevrolet and GMC Trucks — Automatic transmission pointers and shift plates will be illuminated by a SeeLite lead running from a bulb in the instrument cluster.

The scientific phenomenon of transmitting light over distances and bending it around corners by means of glass tubes and glass fibers is not a new discovery. However, the recent development of a plastic fiber material has made possible a practical and somewhat revolutionary place for the phenomenon in the automotive industry. In addition to its flexibility, SeeLite allows for an increase in the intensity of the light transmitted, simply by the addition of more Crofon fibers to the assembly.

A special room in the Research-Engineering Center is equipped with ambient light control and positioning devices for full-scale mock-up and evaluation of fiber optic systems. Human reaction to light colors, intensities, location and direction can be studied and engineering specifications developed.

Prior to shipment to automotive manufacturers, each individual SeeLite lead is checked by electronic testing equipment to insure that it measures up to high GM quality standards.
